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From the Vicar

Whether or not you wear the ashen cross on your forehead out into the world after the Ash Wednesday service is a deeply personal decision. I know it is for me. The tension between, perhaps, a certain amount of self-conscious embarrassment for having a strange mark on your head on the one hand, and spiritual pride in being religious and ready to let others know on the other, makes it an interesting position to be in. After some prayerful consideration one might come to the same conclusion that I have regarding this rather small spiritual dilemma. However you go forth with the ashes the two most important

things above all others are thankfulness and self-forgetfulness.

It's helpful to name these spiritual postures aloud, because they are really at the heart of the entire season of Lent.

Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return. These are the words that wash over us as we enter the season of Lent. This pronouncement is like a doorway, a threshold one crosses as one steps into holy time, kairos time, set apart for reflection and renewal in God. However one might think of it—whether as a doorway, threshold or something else—these words carry weight and significance. They bring one's mortality into sharp focus, which for most of us is almost always a passing thought, not a primary one; but Ash Wednesday invites us to consider it and dwell in it. It asks us to abandon our illusions of self-sufficiency and return to child-like dependence on God alone. And it commends this invitation to us in a most strange and wonderful way with the imposition of ashes upon the forehead.

What should never be lost is that this mark upon the forehead is at heart a *blessing*. It's the same cross in the same place that was given to us at baptism. And that's no mistake. You belong to God. The whole of you from head to toe. There is not one molecule that God has not blessed and called into being. The only question and is whether we can hear it and receive it and live by it. Centering our selves back down onto that reality is the work of Lent. It begins with repentance but is sustained by thankfulness. And thankfulness is the road that leads to lasting joy and peace.

For many the Lenten journey includes an element of fasting (or giving something up) or study (taking something on). Taking on one *small* practice or commitment can be a huge benefit. The Wednesday Night Lenten Series is definitely worth considering. The Rev Frank Spina will be leading us through a deep dive into The Psalms, which contain the most widely read, studied, and sung passages in all of scripture. And the only portion of scripture to be printed in the Book of Common Prayer in its entirety. As Fr Frank has said, "Its exquisite poetry, its extensive metaphors, its unyielding passion, and its jarring honesty have contributed to its exalted status in the mind of religious people. Mystics have long cherished this material." The evening will begin with a simple soup/salad/bread supper and fellowship, and continue from there.

In whatever way you come to the season of Lent, and journey through it, may you rediscover the depth of God's love that created you, redeemed you, and sustains you now and always.

Cold Weather Shelter Update

The volunteers for the St. Aidan's Cold Weather Shelter were ready to serve when the cold weather front came through Camano and Stanwood early this month. It was a thing of beauty to see all the people show up to ensure that those who came to seek shelter found warmth, comfort and support. The volunteers came four consecutive nights only to return home shortly after 9 p.m. when it became clear that there would be no overnight visitors.

Several of the volunteers left the shelter with heavy hearts, disappointed that they were not able to provide for those in need. One of the shelter volunteers and Stanwood/Camano Resource Center Board President, Brooke Knight, reminded



team members that people who live in homeless conditions are slow to trust new situations so she was not surprised. She encouraged us to stay positive as with time, they would come to trust us and come stay at the shelter

Michelle Ballard, resource coordinator of the Resource Center had also prepared us for the very real possibility that this would happen. "It will take a while and will be hard for volunteers to show up with no visitors, please keep showing up, by being open and being there; it is building trust," she told us at one of our earlier meetings. She shared stories that helped us understand what led to their distrust of new places and new people. "I will be reaching out to people who I think should have shown up this last weekend and trying to learn why they didn't," she said with hope in her voice.

At coffee hour recently, the Cold Weather Shelter Team, Kevin King, Peter Dunphy and Donna Myers sat with Gloria Archambault, who reached out to us with her knowledge about the local homeless. She drives the bus for Snow Goose Transit and has developed trusting relationships with those who ride on her routes, going so far as to providing them with things they need such as sleeping bags, clothing and blankets. She has been very concerned with a few, who she knows know about the cold weather shelter and yet, do not come. Gloria said that she believes that some of them choose to stay in their cars because that's what they know; that's where there are no surprises.



She also said that she believes that a lot of folks who live in their cars still don't know about the shelter. "We should put big fliers up at the Stanwood laundromat and at QFC and at Grocery Outlet," Gloria said as those are places she knows they go. She emphasized BIG fliers. Another great suggestion she had was that when we do have people spend the night, that we call the bus service providers well in advance when possible to let them know and they will make special trips to pick up passengers in the morning.

We are also grateful to so many community members who continue to reach out to us to help, such as the LDS Church right next door whose women's group offered their services where needed and forwarded our contact information to their men's group.

So we now look ahead to the next time Mother Nature brings us cold, cold nights. We will be ready to serve.

The Psalter has long been favored by Christians and Jews alike. It is the only section of Scripture that is quoted verbatim in the Book of Common Prayer. Its exquisite poetry, its extensive metaphors, its unyielding passion, and its jarring honesty have contributed to its exalted status in the minds of religious people. Mystics have long cherished this material. We may have an inkling of the power of the Psalter as we delve into psalms that deal with themes that we typically associate with Lent: Being close to or distant from God; confession; repentance; absolution; divine compassion, and the like.

February 21: "God's Devastating Absence and Exhilarating Presence: Psalms 22 and 23"

February 28: "Forgiveness in a Variety of Metaphors: Psalm 32"

March 6: "The Anatomy of a Confession: Psalm 51"

March 13: "The Nature of a Forgiving God: Psalm 103"

March 20: "God's Maddening Ubiquity: Psalm 139"

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
