From the Vicar

They say "April showers bring May flowers," but the rhododendrons are already in full bloom on Camano Island! Nonetheless, May is still very much a transitional month. Many graduates will walk across the stage to receive their diplomas this month and embark on new chapters in their lives. Mothers will be honored for the gracious gifts and contributions they make to our families and communities, and this will point to the day in June when we will do the same for fathers. In addition, the summer festival kick-off dinner will happen May 21st and thus begin the journey to one of our most celebrated and cherished events

of the year. And, of course, one would be remiss not to mention that Pentecost comes May 19th. On this feast the Church will have its "birthday" once more, recalling the day the Holy Spirit descended upon and empowered the disciples and apostles to move beyond those locked doors and into the world proclaiming the Good News of God's love in Christ Jesus. May is kind of a big month!

After all of that, Trinity Sunday will arrive May 26th and shift us from the season of Easter into a period we call "Ordinary Time," which is anything but ordinary. This is perhaps the greatest and most underrated change occurring in this beautiful month we call May. Simply put, ordinary is extraordinary. (It sounds a bit like an oxymoron, but it's closer to a paradox.) Let me explain. In a time when everything is growing bigger, moving faster, and is more dynamic than ever the unadorned, simple, and ordinary things of life are where true joys are more likely to be found. There is something essential to leaning into the reality that life's most precious and holy moments don't usually happen online with a keyboard but on the front porch with a friend. The moments of holiness that truly propel us forward often look more like gratefulness washing over us as the breath-taking beauty of a flower in full bloom is really seen, and less like a YouTube video, rock concert, or an overbooked calendar. When we are tuned to hear and see the small blessings all around us we are primed to see the big ones too. The fact that the Church's longest "season" of the year is "Ordinary Time" is either a happy accident or a stroke of deep wisdom.

As we move closer to Ordinary Time, Memorial Day weekend, and the long stretches of daylight that bless our days we might remember that the "ordinary" some folks experience is not so wonderful. A life in the throes of poverty is certainly simple, but hardly feels like blessing. A time of loss, grief and depression often reduce life down to simple day-by-day living, but such simplicity doesn't always translate to hope. The season of "Ordinary Time", however, can help us remember that it's not typically big flashy overtures or one's ability to fix things that matter. It's the usually the most ordinary things that make the difference. Being present without words for those in pain is powerful medicine. A smile can shoot across the room like an arrow dipped in love and change a person's whole day. It's precisely in the ordinary that healing, wholeness and life happen.

As you move through the month of May, may you find joy as God leads you into new and ordinary and wonderful things.

This past winter, the film adaptation of Daniel James Brown's novel, "Boys in the Boat", was released to an admiring public — especially here in the Pacific Northwest. The "Boys in the Boat" were nine young sophomores, rowing for the University of Washington, who, against all odds, take on their upperclassmen, the wealthy fraternity kids of the East Coast and eventually, the Nazis in the 1936 Olympics.

The team effort — the perfectly synchronized flow of muscle, oars, boat and water; the single, whole, unified, and beautiful symphony that a crew in motion becomes — is all that matters. Mr. Brown continues ...

The highly refined coordination and cooperation must be multiplied out across eight individuals of varying statures and physiques to make the most of each individual's strength. Only in this way can the capabilities that come with diversity — lighter, more technical rowers in the bow and stronger, heavier pullers in the middle of the boat, for instance — be turned to advantage rather than disadvantage.

His words are thoughtful and enlightening.

Like a synchronized crew in motion, we, too are a team, made up of different statures, strengths and capabilities. We're working together for a unified purpose and that is to share our faith and reflect back to our community, the light of Christ. We're a team of exceptional talents and interests *pulling together* for a single purpose.

If you have been thinking about becoming more involved here at St. Aidan's Episcopal Church, there are several ministries to consider. You would be very welcome! There is much to do and our work-outs and hours of training do vary. It's a team effort and we're all **pulling together**. For sure, you'll have a seat in our boat!



Windows of St Aidan's

The 10 windows in the sanctuary tell the story of the spread of the Good news in the British Isles over a period of seven hundred years (63 AD to 735 AD) through the lives of ten saints. Each saint has a window and the sequence is chronological.

A debt of gratitude is owed to these saints for the gifts given through their faith and sacrifices—the gifts of the Good News and a rich Church history and tradition.



Window 2: St Alban, Martyr Verulamium (now St Albans, Hertfordshire (*His symbol is the martyr's cross and crown*)

St Alban was the first British martyr (Protomartyr Anglorum) During the great imperial persecution of the Emperor Decius, Alban gave sanctuary to a Christian priest who converted and baptized him. When local soldiers came to arrest the priest, Alban exchanged his garment for the priest's robe and was captured in his stead. When he refused to deny his baptism he was put to death.
