From the Vicar

After nearly twenty years of YouTube being a part of modern life I'm convinced that its best and brightest moments are not found in the news programs, podcasts, or even instructive tutorials; no, the very best of YouTube is found in its millions cat videos! (To be fair, the dog videos are pretty great too.) From cats falling asleep and hilariously tumbling off their window sills or high perches to felines doing back flips or kittens bobbing their little heads to music in perfect time - there's just too much to love. One of my all-time favorites is a video showing a small toddler walking out onto the balcony of her family's high-rise apartment and trying to climb the rail, and unknowingly pull herself into danger. With cool confidence the family cat jumps up on top of the rail, moves across it like a tightrope walker to the child, and bats her hands away repeatedly until she gives

up. The deep sense of love and devotion was so evident that it was clear I was not looking at a mere pet, but a family member. A being who would risk its life for another.

Specifically, that of the bright orange pumpkin variety. It shows up in fall window and table decorations, in Starbucks' pumpkin spice lattes, and at every doorstep and Halloween party across the country. It is a symbol of harvest and abundance, but also, when carved, of joy, fun, and whimsy. I love that St Aidan's always knows how to have fun and celebrate the times and seasons that make life wonderful. Night of 100 Pumpkins has been one such occasion. A time to come together as a community for a ghoulishly good time is always a blessing. I hope it continues in 2024.


Now that most services offer a 'paperless' option, I no longer needed two filing cabinets in the office area. One entire cabinet, made up of four pull-out rolling drawers had to be

'purged'. So, I took the time to look through the files and consolidate everything into just one cabinet.

Some of the filing drawers contained old records that were easy to toss and shred. Other drawers contained stuff that was nostalgic, sentimental and quite endearing.

One entire drawer was labeled 'Roxie Veleke'. Roxie was my mom. Some of you may remember her. She was an active member of St. Aidan's and truly loved the years she worshiped and served from 1986 until her stroke in 2012. I approached this drawer with some reverence and care.

One file in the drawer contained her wallet. I forgot that it was in there. I opened the wallet slowly, still having the smell of leather and showing a fingerprint left near the snap closure. She must have put hand lotion on one time and then needed to get something from it — leaving her print. Something that was so uniquely her very own.



Inside was nine dollars but no change. In the first slot was a picture of my dad. He was about 24 years old and a newly commissioned Washington State patrolman. He looked so handsome in his uniform, standing proudly next to his 1937 patrol car. She carried that picture for many years and all four edges were worn and creased. Next to the picture were her driver's license issued in 2010, when she was 92, and a VISA credit card, long expired. There were other forms of identification such as her Social Security card, a Public Library card, her Group Health Medicare Rx card, an AARP membership, several business cards of mine and my brothers' and another especially meaningful one was Father Bob's card — Rev. Dr. Robert G. Dietel Vicar - St.

Then, folded into a tiny paper book and tucked inside was the Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi.



Lord,

Make me an instrument of Your peace;

Where there is hatred, let me sow love;

Where there is injury, pardon;

Where there is doubt, faith:

Where there is despair, hope;

Where there is darkness, light;

Where there is sadness, joy.

O Divine Master,

Grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console;

To be understood as to understand:

To be loved as to love.

For it is in giving that we receive,

It is in pardoning that we are pardoned.

It is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

Everything contained in the wallet was specific to her and it all created a record of her life on earth — account numbers, membership identification, medical records, family contacts and photos of people she loved and statements of faith that she believed. I made my way on to the next file and there was her death certificate.

So...what's in my wallet? A sure promise that when my daughter comes upon it — she'll know I was born in October, loved my Nordstrom card, rarely used my gym card and there too, will be a worn picture of her dad. Eventually, she'll come upon a death certificate. However, with confidence she'll know that it won't be the end to my story.

"Campus Wayfinding" – Improving the directional signage around St. Aidan campus continues to be studied in support of the Bishop Committee Mutual Ministry Goal of "making St. Aidan more welcoming". Drew, Greg Meyers, Keving King and I met with a graphic artist who presented some ideas using metal signs supported by large rocks. Refinement of these ideas is in work and a plan will be presented at the October BC meeting.



Dietel Hall Entry & Bathrooms –. The Bishop Committee (BC) was presented with a plan to remodel Dietel Hall. Funding the changes will be discussed at the October BC

meeting, The plan includes removing and replace bathroom doors, sink, vanity, mirror, light, fan, toilet, wall paneling, and floor. Replace entry floor and kitchen to match bathroom. Remove and replace molding around doors and floor, update lighting in entry way, fix the ceiling and repaint.

Landscape – Lankford Landscape Design (Scott Lankford) is developing a landscape plan for the campus. (ProBono) This also includes the PUD certificates for 10 trees to be placed near the power lines paralleling SR 532.

Entry Door – The new entry door requires a little force to open. The door manufacturing has been notified and is working to resolve this issue.

St Aidan's Outreach

The members of the St. Aidan's Outreach committee and members of the Bishop Committee met on Wednesday, September 18 to discuss the current Outreach committee activities and the possibility of broadening the Outreach committee mission. Currently the Outreach Committee activities focus on distribution of festival funds to local non-profits who provide support services to those in need. In 2023 these non-profits included Camano Center (Adult Daycare), Circlewood Church, Bridgid Collins Family Support Center, Stanwood Camano Food Bank (Backpack program), Camano Island Law Enforcement (Human Trafficking Education), Skagit Valley Domestic Violence and Assault Services, and Stanwood – Camano Resource Center (Emergency Funds for the unhoused). Some of the additional Outreach activities done by St. Aidan's include Annual Festival, Easter Egg Hunt, Coat Drive, Seafarer Ditty Bags, Seafarer visits, Gathering Place (5th Thursday of the month), Cold Weather Shelter, Plant Sale proceeds to a non-profit, Night of 100 Pumpkins, Message Board Sign, and Diocese Refugee Resettlement Office support.

A suggestion that the Outreach committee restart presentations from non-profits during Sunday forums and possibly expand Outreach support to include regional and international non-profits was discussed.
