From the Vicar

Air travel is one of the true modern marvels of our era. That three hundred souls can board a glorified tin can and be thrust from zero to two hundred miles an hour and launched into the stratosphere is mind boggling, even for someone who has experienced it countless times. That you can step into a huge cylindrical object with the population of a small town and be ferried from the Pacific to the Atlantic in five hours is beyond comprehension, even in the age of A.I. And the fact that it is safer (statistically) than driving your car seems absolutely impossible. While tragedies do occur, and they are heartbreaking, you also see people like Sully Sullenberger land an Airbus A320 with two downed engines on the Hudson River. Air travel is truly amazing. It has knit the world together and bridged chasms of space and time in unimaginable ways.

Other technologies like artificial intelligence, social media, text messaging, and Zoom have made the world even smaller. They make distances evaporate magically. Countless miles of separation seem to disappear when you're seeing pictures and video of friends and family in real time from the other side of the continent. In addition, every citizen can now be a journalist with a camera in their pocket and satellite internet connection. Images travel around the world in seconds from person to person and almost no one is out of reach. With all of this physical and virtual connective possibility the world should be much safer, much less lonely, and much more flourishing. We can see anything or anyone whenever we want and nothing is beyond the click of a mouse or the tap of a screen. And yet what we're learning from Gen Z, the generation that has only ever known a digital world, is that that's not entirely the case.

Real life — the kind that matters — cannot be all virtualized, digitized, or monetized. Air travel is exhausting and hugs don't happen on Zoom. These technologies are incredible tools but they cannot replace human community and in-person contact. The church as the body of Christ has much to share with the world on this front. The God we know and worship chose to be with his people in-person. The healing Jesus did was done by touching people's bodies, not their online profiles. He gave them renewed power to stand, walk, see, feel, taste, touch, sing and praise. He healed by being present, by being in community, and by loving the people in his midst. The strength and grace of the church will always be transformational because it is always, as Jesus was, "incarnational" (literally, in the flesh). Smiles and tears and the hope in your neighbors' eyes can sometimes be felt virtually (thank God!) but are best known in person.

With the bishop's visit to St Aidan's on March 2 this all fits. He could simply send us a letter, send an emissary, or Zoom in. In certain circumstances these are all perfectly fine options! But his priority is to be with us. Really with us. His leadership as an instrument of communion, a sign and symbol of our common life with the wider church, is something that is carried out with skin in the game. He wants a personal relationship with us, and we with him; and what a grace that is.

As we gather for our Annual Meeting we do so as the body of Christ. Each of us bring something to this community just by virtue of being who we are. Your presence, your physical, made-in-the-image-of-God presence, blesses the church and makes it better and stronger.

May you know that whoever you are, and wherever you are on the journey of faith, you are a blessing. Yours in Christ,

From the Senior Warden

Habits

I'll begin with the words of historian Will Durant, summarizing Aristotle: "We are what we repeatedly do ... therefore excellence is not an act, but a habit."

In my personal experience, the results of bad habits or good habits don't become obvious to me until several days, months or years have passed. It's then, with reflection and honesty, that I eventually see the outcome of what I do or what I don't do.

A perfect example of a bad habit that I was consistently doing became apparent in a recent medical lab report, reflecting elevated numbers because of poor eating habits! These lab results didn't just happen — it has taken me years of choosing cookies, crackers, breads and deserts to bump up my glucose numbers.

Another example would be exercise. Choosing to exercise on a regular basis is a good habit. All of the benefits of regular exercise become obvious and visible after days, months and years of continued motivation and use. However, I have depended upon my will and that has not worked very well. The results have been — added weight and less stamina.

Eating and exercise are not the only choices in life that will have a good or a poor outcome, based upon what I do or what I don't do. Building habits that will strengthen by faith, my understanding of scripture and my walk with Christ are of great importance. My spiritual self will prosper with healthy habits of prayer, reading and meditating upon scripture along with Christian fellowship.

Much of what is done each day happens automatically as the result of our habits. If our character is shaped by our day-to-day actions, then who we are is determined to a large degree by our habits. So, what we choose to do or not to do over time, has lasting effects on us physically, emotionally and spiritually.

In reflection, I need to acknowledge my habits and most certainly recognize the impact they are having on my overall health and how I am growing spiritually and thriving emotionally. How are my day to day choices, behaviors and habits exposing my true character?

I appreciated this thought written by the freelance writer, Walker Larson. "A virtue can be defined as a good habit built up through repeated good actions, while a vice is a bad habit reinforced through repeated bad actions. Virtues and vices shape our character, little by little, like the blows of a chisel on stone, revealing a sculpture."

Always before us is the challenge between virtue and vice and how we choose eventually shapes and reveals our true character.

Self improvement starts with realistic goals and our expectations need to be patient. There is a world of virtuous habits out there and making good choices requires that we put one foot in front of the other and then follow the rewards that will come with time.

I'm going to start, this very day, working toward some exceptionally good habits. Habits that become automatic and result in virtuous character and overall good health. I'll face weakness, from time to time, and want to take the easy road. When that happens, I'll rely on prayer, reading scripture and an encouraging, like-minded friend to hold me accountable. It'll be just baby steps for a while and after repeated good actions, it'll become a good habit, and one that comes without thought or effort.


From the Junior Warden

- Dietel Hall Remodel Completion: The remodel of Dietel Hall is now complete! This significant project has resulted in a more functional and welcoming space for our congregation and community.
- Campus Wayfinding Improvements Initiated: The first step in improving wayfinding within the church campus has been taken with the manufacturing of a new directional sign. - New garbage Bin Enclosure. A new garbage bin enclosure has been built



Windows of St Aidan's

The 10 windows in the sanctuary tell the story of the spread of the Good news in the British Isles over a period of seven hundred years (63 AD to 735 AD) through the lives of ten saints. Each saint has a window and the sequence is chronological.

A debt of gratitude is owed to these saints for the gifts given through their faith and sacrifices—the gifts of the Good News and a rich Church history and tradition.

Window 7: St Aidan, Bishop and Confessor, Lindisfarne, Northumbria



His symbol is a torch—he brought the light of the Gospel to northern England and established Lindisfarne which served as a beacon of light in a dark time.

The Venerable Bede records that Aidan, an Irish monk of Iona, was sent as missionary bishop to Northumbrians at the request of their king, Oswald. Bishop Aidan met with success in his efforts to convert the kingdom, and established his monastery on the island of Lindisfarne, which has come to be known as the Holy Isle.

His humility, kindness and holiness won him the respect and affection of all people in northern England, making him of equal importance, as a servant of Christ, to St Augustine of Canterbury. Lindisfarne became a center of faith, learning, and refuge in

those fearful times of constant warfare and lapses into heathen ways.


