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From the Vicar

As we enter the month of April we do so in the season of Lent, but we exit in the season of Easter. There is something especially "Eastery" about that. Liturgically and spiritually speaking, the month begins in the valley and ends on the mountaintop. It begins in the desert and ends by streams of water abounding with life. It begins with songs of lament and ends with songs of praise and thanksgiving. This pattern of death-to-life is *the* defining reality of our faith. It's lived out in our churches year after year as the story of God in Christ is told and retold again and again through what we pray and sing and confess with our lips and lives.

One way we tell this story and take this journey is through "burying the alleluia." I remember being a part of a church in Bellevue that literally buried the alleluia every year. They had a large wooden board with the colorful letters A-L-L-E-L-U-I-A emblazoned across it. At the beginning of Lent it was placed in a freshly dug hole and covered over. When Easter arrived it was unearthed and returned to the sanctuary where it hung from the lectern for a Sunday or two. It was left there just long enough to launch the word back into our souls. The visceral experience of burying and restoring the alleluia was memorable and beautiful in a very simple and very real way.

The alleluia, however, does not need to be buried beneath dirt to be felt with a renewed depth at Easter. It can simply be set aside for a time. Released from regular usage for a period. But I can hear some of my evangelical friends saying, "Why would you ever to hold back an alleluia?! Aren't you short changing God?" Not at all. A pastor who wrote a book of short, poetic reflections on the gift and challenges of ministry asked a helpful question at the end of one chapter: If you did not have your hands, legs or voice how would you go about loving your people? There is much grace, and much to be gained, in saying (or doing) less sometimes. God's love is not increased by the length of our prayers, the greatness of our efforts, or the enthusiasm of our alleluias. God's love is a constant, bottomless well that is known only in surrender to the one who died for us and rose again.

When Easter finally arrives there is always this sense of feeling different and "resurrected" and yet the same. After the rigors of holy week worship, which treks through the last hours of Jesus' life, betrayal and death, one is ready for Easter morn. When it arrives there is a burst of color and light and joy and one is supposed to be feel it all. He is risen! we say. And he is. He most *definitely* is. But the real joy of Easter is found not just in the proclamation, but the knowledge that Jesus is risen regardless of how we may or may not feel about it! He is risen for believers and non-believers alike. He is risen for the fervent pray-ers and the agnostics. He is risen for the down-and-out and those on the up-and-up. He is risen for the doubters and the over-confident. He is risen for the weak and the strong, the healthy and infirm, the cheerful and the mourners. He is risen for cerebral intellectuals and for down-to-earth simple folk. He is risen for our enemies and for our friends. He is risen for you and for me.

As you journey to Easter Day may you know that there is no height or depth, width or length, or and any distance that can separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus. For the Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia!

At last year's Ministry Fair, we were told by more than one person that they started attending St. Aidan's because of the sign. Our message is reaching others.

During this season of Lent, we've strived to keep our messages appropriate for this time of reflection. We hope you, and our community, find it a blessing on your journey.

One of the most important aspects of Lenten spirituality is repentance and forgiveness. In our Lenten series we will pay close attention to several biblical texts that address this crucial subject.

The last two of the series (April 2 and April 9):

One of Jesus' Kingdom parables (Matthew 18:23-25) features a man who was forgiven an enormous debt but refused to forgive a much more modest debt owed to him by a fellow servant. This is a chilling parable. Finally, we will deal with the controversial letter of Philemon, in which the Apostle Paul wants a Master and a Slave to be brothers in the faith.

Dear Friends, we are moving forward with our One Parish One Prisoner (OPOP) ministry.

This has taken some time because of a variety of issues, but Father Drew called a meeting in March and we had enough community members sign up to build a team. All are welcome to participate in our team building and it would be good to have others to provide encouragement, and support.

This is a two-year journey. The basic parts of this ministry are to form a team of seven members including our Spiritual Leader, Father Drew.

The first year we would have a monthly workshop with modules presented by OPOP. We would also begin communicating with someone from our area who is incarcerated and begin to build a relationship over the course of the first year.

The second year we would use what we learned from our workshops and also our own learned experience and wisdom to guide and help this person as they are released back into the mainstream of society.

As we begin this journey all are welcomed, if you are curious please contact me. And as our meetings are scheduled please feel free to come and participate perhaps as we all learn together, another team may develop.

We begin this journey together as the community of St Aidan's. I cannot think of a better time to begin than in the season of Lent, leading up to our most sacred time of Easter and the Resurrection.

Well, the crazy Seattle winter weather got closer to normal in late February and March. Temperatures hovered in the 40s/50s with no nights below freezing. This was quite a change from the near 3 weeks of constant cold we had in January/February. No Cold Weather Shelter (CWS) overnight stays during that time. You may have said a prayer or two of gratitude. I know for a fact that the volunteers for the Cold Weather Shelter (CWS) did! Heading to church or home from church at 1am was not an easy feat. Those shifts were killers!

The CWS team extends a gigantic THANK YOU to all of those who volunteered! To those who volunteered AT the shelter, thank you. To see someone in their late 70s, even 80s, show up to help out till one o' clock in the morning, well, it was like seeing Jesus walk into our midst. Thank you to those who did the bedding laundry, who cooked food for those who found shelter at St. Aidan's, who managed the volunteer system and who made phone calls to request volunteer help when the automated volunteer system wasn't enough. There were more nights that guests didn't come, but our volunteers kept coming faithfully, and always with a smile and when people did come, our volunteers were quick to provide help and always with compassion. It's one of those things in life that you find yourself feeling so fortunate to witness.

Also, we are so grateful to our neighbors at the LDS Church. They responded lickity-split from our request for help with not only volunteers but warm food for our guests. God is good!

On another note regarding those in need of housing, Kevin King, Peter Dunphy, Kusum Batey, Donna Myers and Fr. Drew have joined Stanwood-Camano Area Foundation (SCAF) efforts to address the issues of the unhoused. To date we shared our experiences and participated in meetings with other SCAF stakeholders. Several good things are in the works for our Stanwood-Camano community. We'll share as they come to fruition.

We will meet next month to discuss and refine operating procedures for next winter and a celebration will be held later in spring. If you have any suggestions or would like to join our team, please don't hesitate to reach out to any one of us.

Festival 2025 Things are building slowly for another big Festival. The south shed is essentially full, although there is room for light items on top. The north shed is three-quarters full. There is no longer room for big pieces of furniture. Those will have to wait until Festival week (14-19 July).

We are trying to make space and a little extra money by selling big/marketable items as Festival PreSales on Facebook Marketplace. So far we've sold a bookcase and a dresser-shelf combination.



The big news is we have totally rebuilt the church trailer. During tear-down, we learned that the trailer is 20 years old. Several boards were rotted out and it was becoming unsafe to utilize. Through the efforts of Peter Dunphy, Joey Sontheimer, Jerry Minnear and myself we rebuilt the trailer in the Dunphy Woodworking Center. We are now ready for the Spring-Summer rush.



Last, but not least, we have our annual Festival Kick-off scheduled on May 13th starting at 6pm. Hot Dogs to be provided. Bring your favorite tail-gate side dish. This is an opportunity to provide some background on Festival, fill key roles and have a little fun.
