From the Vicar

"Remember that you are but dust, and to dust you shall return." These are the holy and solemn words that come to us as ash is pressed onto the skin of our forehead during the Ash Wednesday service. These words are "holy" because they are set apart, not used on any other occasion or for any other purpose. They are "solemn" because they have gravity, weight and importance for our lives. Their meaning is deep and significant because they speak of a reality that we all understand, though at times may push to the side and choose to forget. Ash Wednesday calls us back to ourselves and to our God. Ash Wednesday calls us back to home base, the place from which all life and love flows.

The reminder of one's mortality on this day can be upsetting and de-centering for some people. For others it can be a source of renewed life and hope. Still others (myself included) experience it both ways and often at the same time! I'm reminded of a recent 60 Minutes documentary on the Orthodox monasteries on the remote and isolated peninsula of Mt Athos in Greece. The monks who live there take vows for life that include never leaving the monastery. They have no phone, internet, television, news papers, or any other connection to the outside world. Their days are spent praying constantly without ceasing, whether in the divine liturgy at the chapel or while harvesting fruit from the orchard. In almost every moment of their daily lives their prayer is the same prayer over and over again: Lord Jesus Christ have mercy on me a sinner. One might think that these monks are the most dour of all men, but in fact they were filled with joy and light. One monk led the camera crew around the monastery grounds and to an open pile of bones and explained that the dry bones are all of past brothers. He expressed a sense of joy at the thought that one day his bones will join the pile. At first it was off-putting to see him standing next to those bones and hear him say what he said, but then came a sense that he knew something at a much deeper level than I did. By embracing the reality of mortality in the light of God's goodness and grace he was able to embrace life (and eternity) with unencumbered love and joy.

While the ashes upon our foreheads are a sign of our mortality and penitence, they are also much more than that. They are, in fact, a *blessing*. The sign of the cross that was traced on our foreheads with holy oil at baptism sits side-by-side with the cross we wear on Ash Wednesday. The words "You are sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked as Christ's own forever" that accompany baptism fit well with Ash Wednesday's "You are but dust and to dust you shall return." Together they seem to strike a harmonious chord. A beautiful chord in which God can be heard saying "I'm yours. Will you be mine?"

As Lent arrives and we contemplate how we might invite God into our hearts anew, whether by taking something on or giving something up, may we remember that love undergirds it all. One way to step into a more heart-felt Lent could be joining Fr Frank Spina's Wednesday Night Lenten Series on forgiveness. You won't be disappointed.

But however you come to this year's Lenten season may God take you on a deeper journey into his life, love, and truth.

One thing we always do when we travel is try to visit local churches. This one is on the tiny coral atoll of Fakarava. Note the chandeliers made of coral and shells.

It was an unexpected and amazing journey. Now it is time to start a new journey together with my St. Aidan's faith family and friends.

St. Aidan's Annual Meeting

Below is an abbreviated summary of the minutes for the Annual Meeting held on February 2nd that was held in person and broadcast on St Aidan's YouTube channel. When approved by the Bishop's Committee the complete minutes will be posted in Dietel Hall.

The meeting opened with prayer and a call to order.

Presentation:

- St. Aidan's Mission and Vision were reviewed.
- Voting Requirements per the Constitution & Canons of The Episcopal Church were reviewed.
- Presentation of Bishop's Committee (BC) Candidates & Floor Nominations: Hellen DeMoyse, Michael Palmer and John Mathis were presented as candidates for the open seats on the Bishop's Committee and duly elected with no other candidates nominated from the floor..
- Senior Warden Thanksgiving & Torch Passing: Thanks were extended to Vonda Buse for her 2024 service as Senior Warden. It was announced that Candi Bialon will serve as St. Aidan's Senior Warden for 2025.

The members that are leaving the committee (Vonda Buse, Peter Dunphy, Ray Riches, and Dick Philmlee) were thanked for their service. Father Drew Foisie stated an appointment will be made soon to fill the remaining year of Dick Philmlee's term.

It was announced that Marilyn Rockwell was elected by the Bishop's Committee to serve as Junior Warden in 2025.

- **Approve the 2024 Minutes**: The meeting minutes for the 2024 Annual Meeting were formally approved by the congregation.
- Floor Nominations for Delegates to the Diocesan Convention (Two for 2-year term): _Dave Wood and Dick Philmlee who served as Alternates in 2024 to the Diocesan Convention will be St. Aidan's Delegates in 2025. John Mathis and Deannie Dunbar were nominated and approved as the 2025 Alternates and Delegates for 2026..
- **Commissioning of New Leaders**: The new leaders were recognized and commissioned by Father Drew Foisie for their service in the coming year.
- Resolution regarding check signers for the checking account: A resolution to update the authorized signers on the St Aidan's Episcopal Church checking account was formally approved.
- Treasurer's Report & 2025 Budget Presentation: Jeff Maxwell delivered his remarks (via telephone connection) and highlighted several items from the 2024 Results and 2025 Budget (included in Annual Report, pg 9-10).
- Vote to Ratify the 2026 Budget: Motion to ratify the budget for 2025 as presented was made and approved without objections.
- **Vicar's Report** (2024 Transitions, Sacramental Data, Notables for Celebration): Father Drew discussed the topics listed on series of slides that highlighted events and accomplishments of the past year.
- Odds & Ends (Praise reports, Impromptu Recognitions, Announcements):
 Up coming events were noted and various members of the congregation gave "shout-outs" of recognition and thanks for their service to St Aidan's.
- **Adjournment and Dismissal**: The Annual Meeting was adjourned and the congregation reconvened in Dietel Hall for a potluck meal.

St Aidan's Cold Weather Shelter

Well....what a difference a month makes. From late January through just before Valentine's Day we had almost three solid weeks of below freezing weather. With that, we had our St Aidan's Cold Weather Shelter open almost every night except when we couldn't raise a full complement of first shift/second shift volunteers.

While the nights with no guests outnumbered the nights with guests, we've had a total of eleven guests. While our quantity of guests is slowly growing, we have plenty of room to grow. We did have one over night with three dogs!

Each guest brought their own unique stories. Mike was nursing a small flat-bed truck back to health which he was using for a wood cutting and hauling business. He related several recent hardships in his life and stayed with us several nights. He eventually wants to get to his property in New Mexico. Mark is the "goat guy" and has been sleeping outside in several different locations recently. He currently has a friend caring for his goats. Mark is thinking of heading to West Virginia someday. Vic's truck broke down in Stanwood. The cashier at Marathon gas station told him about our Cold Weather Shelter. Vic brought his (3) dogs, which stayed with him overnight.

While our guest numbers are growing slower than we had hoped, our volunteer support from St Aidan's and the Stanwood-Camano community has been outstanding. We have had (23) different folks staying the evening and overnight over (21) guest days. Several of our non-St Aidan's volunteers are a result of Island County sharing our requests for help with their Emergency Preparedness distribution list. Donna Myers has also reached out to our brothers and sisters at our neighboring Latter Day Saints church and they have provided several volunteers.

St Aidan's has also been well represented at the Stanwood Camano Area Foundation (SCAF) efforts in serving the unhoused. SCAF has several upcoming initiatives for the unhoused that they are nurturing. We will share more as it comes to fruition.

We can all be proud of our St Aidan's Cold Weather Shelter outreach efforts and the positive impact they are starting to have in the Stanwood Camano community. Thanks to all who have supported us. Six more cold weeks of weather to go.

Lenten Series with Fr Frank Spina (Five Wednesdays beginning March 10th at 5pm)

One of the most important aspects of Lenten spirituality is repentance and forgiveness. In our Lenten series we will pay close attention to several biblical texts that address this crucial subject. We will deal with Esau's reconciling embrace of the brother who had so terribly wronged him. In the story featuring Joseph, he had to deal with several brothers who had betrayed him. Did the fact that God was with him have anything to do with his amazing act of

forgiveness? David's affair with Bathsheba and murder of her husband was famously forgiven. Yet, the consequences of David's sins remained. We will attend to this troubling account. One of Jesus' Kingdom parables (Matthew 18:23-25) features a man who was forgiven an enormous debt but refused to forgive a much more modest debt owed to him by a fellow servant. This is a chilling parable. Finally, we will deal with the controversial letter of Philemon, in which the Apostle Paul wants a Master and a Slave to be brothers in the faith.


A reminder:


