From the Vicar

As July rolls around each year the excitement ratchets up around St Aidan's Episcopal Church. There are volunteer coordination meetings and emails, sign painters slathering back letters and directional arrows on white backgrounds, and many other busy bees prepping the church campus to receive numerous visitors come the third Saturday of the month. The storage shed, now packed to the gills, is evaluated in anticipation of the day when hidden treasures and overlooked gems will be thoughtfully organized on long plastic tables out on the front lawn. How many tantalizing offerings will fill the tables is anyone's guess. We never know until the everything is brought from the dark bowels of the festival shed and into the full light of day. How many people will flood our grounds after our newly restored church bell rings out at 8:00 am on the big day is also anyone's guess.

You never truly know. The anticipation is energizing.

The church has been full of festivals of all kinds for the last two thousand years, and more are added by each successive generation. That's a beautiful thing, because festivals, or "feasts" as the church calls them, have particular purposes and reasons for being. They are both ends and means. They're usually centered on someone or something God had done to bring grace into the world. Therefore they have good reasons for celebration and in the act of being celebrated the very grace that is the grounds for the celebration in the first place gets brought back into the midst of the people once again. Not to get too theological here, but like a sacrament, they "effect what they signify." In celebrating Christmas, for example, we are not only drawn to Mary and the Christ child, but to all mothers and children and are able to see and experience the palpable presence of God in them in ways we couldn't at any other time. In the festal celebration of the incarnation we become attuned to the incarnational presence of God in the world. The festival instantiates what it celebrates. For this theology nerd I think that's pretty cool!

Feast days and festal occasions are more than just special days observed inside the church. Other meaningful and holy "festivals" happen that don't appear on the church's liturgical calendar. They often go overlooked because they can be a bit atypical. But make no mistake, they too have saints at the center of them. They too bring about God's grace. They too are celebrations of what God has done and is doing. And they often come with their own "traditions."

When our gates open and our new bell rings bright and clear to kick off Summer Festival this July we begin a festal tradition many years in the making. It's our best "feast" centered on community, generosity, and grace. As saints in green t-shirts move about the place helping others find parking, load furniture, purchase treasures with less in their pocket than they thought they had, and experience uncommon kindness, God is known and felt. In the midst of the fellowship our team the Holy Spirit can be known and felt. In the sending out of Festival funds to help those in our wider community most in need, God's work is being known and felt. This one beautiful day in July is a festival indeed!

Grace and peace and joy to you this month as you celebrate the warmth of the weather, the 4th of July, and the Summer Festival!

Windows of St Aidan's

The 10 windows in the sanctuary tell the story of the spread of the Good news in the British Isles over a period of seven hundred years (63 AD to 735 AD) through the lives of ten saints. Each saint has a window and the sequence is chronological.

A debt of gratitude is owed to these saints for the gifts given through their faith and sacrifices—the gifts of the Good News and a rich Church history and tradition.

Window 10: St Bede, Confessor, Northumbria



St. Bede was the great scholar saint of the 8th century, recording the history of the Church in Britain, then England. He lived his entire life in the monasteries of Wearmouth and Jarrow in northern England, translating Holy Scripture from Greek to Latin to the vernacular. His <u>Ecclesiastical History of the English People</u> made him the foremost scholar in Europe in his age, along with many other writings on the "natural order."

St. Bede is buried in the "Galilee" of Durham Cathedral, under a stone which reads "Haec sunt in fossa Bedae venerabilis ossa." It is said that the original inscription had a blank spot in the second line that was miraculously filled with "venerabilis" while the workman took a nap. St. Bede came to be known as the "Venerable Bede" within two generations

of his death.

His symbols are a gold pitcher (earthly learning) filled by silver rays (heavenly wisdom and truth, the ultimate source of earthly learning).

Important Events at St Aidan's in July

July 6 Feed My Sheep Sunday

July 13-18 Summer Festival Set-up, starting after Coffee Hour on Sunday and 9am to 4pm Monday to Friday

July 19 Summer Festival, volunteers to show up at 7am, Festival runs 8am to 5pm

July 31 The Gathering Place, 5:00pm



We are less than a month away from Festival and things are chugging along. Porta Potties are on order. A revised Festival Layout / Transportation Plan has been created. Snow Goose will be providing shuttle service between the Latter Day Saints Church (LDS) parking lot and our campus. Signs galore (with balloons) are in work. Jim, Joanne, Margo and Larry will again be bringing their RVs to Camano Island and sharing Festival with us.

A little more on the revised Festival Layout. Changes were made in our Festival Layout with safety, traffic flow, greater presentation space and improved pickups in mind.

Key Items of Note:

- Snow Goose transportation loop from LDS parking lot to Festival without driving on Hwy 532
- Snow Goose bus is wheelchair capable; no need for handicap parking on St Aidan's property
- NO ENTRY at St Aidan's Hwy 532 entrance on 19 July. Three large 4 ft x 8 ft painted signs at entrance.
- A 2nd Furniture Zone on the east edge of the parking lot wil be added.
- Furniture and other item pickup at the northwest corner on gravel area and in the core parking lot area
- 14 signs of various sizes to be printed with messages to direct traffic plus helium balloons
- Up to 14 sandwich boards will need to be made (work session) to support signage
- Small maps for roving and seated cashiers to give to anyone who needs to come back for furniture or item pickup
- Crab Cracker and Facebook will be communicating these changes

Here's the high-level schedule for Festival week.

<u>Sunday, 13 July</u> (after 10am service) – "Peel away" the donations from on top of our folding tables and setup the tables in "Festival configuration". Please come with clothes you don't mind getting a little dirty. Pickup trucks will help us distribute tables quickly.

Monday, 14 July thru Friday 18 July* (9am to 400pm) – Clear out the sheds, organize donations on tables, set-up book shed, setup/organize Dietel Hall, set-up fencing/driving lanes, local pickup for St Aidan's parishioners/friends, and receive donated items from the community. Donuts/water will be provided at no charge. Lunch will be provided each day for a small charge.

* Happy hour each afternoon in the Dietel Hall breezeway. Bring your favorite beverage and snacks to share Saturday, 19 July

7AM – St Aidan's volunteers arrive. Please park at LDS church. Snow Goose bus available for those who do not wish to walk.

8AM - Festival commences

10AM – Grills fired up

5PM(ish) -Bring out the "Free Sign" to close the Festival and open Happy Hour

<u>Sunday, 20 July</u> (after 10am service) – Start consolidating remaining items and tear down tables and popups.

Monday, 21 July and beyond – Let nature take its course as free items continue move to new homes. Culminated with a dump run, if needed.

There is no space for large items (i.e. furniture) in the sheds. If you have items to donate, if at all possible, please bring them in boxes/bins that are stackable so we can maximize our space. Please make sure you preserve runways in each of the sheds so that we have access to the book shelves and the garage doors. We will continue to take on smallish donations on Sundays after church.


