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From the Vicar

The month of October is here and it comes with an avalanche of colors, sights, sounds, and symbols that signal things are a'changin'. The leaves going from green to yellow to red are the clearest sign that the earth (in the northern hemisphere at least) is in a seasonal transition. The humble orange pumpkin also unmistakably says October and harvest time. November may try to claim this delightful gourd, but it squarely belongs to the 10th month on the calendar. Along with the pumpkin popping up here, there and everywhere comes its coffee companion: the pumpkin spice latte. Ghouls and goblins and the cackle of witches emerge near the end of the month. And lastly, with the week leading up to Halloween comes the Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of Olympia. The two are not connected (Halloween and Convention), but perhaps they should be!

That would make for an interesting experience.

I've never been the kind of Christian who pooh-poohs Halloween or dressing up as ghosts, ghouls and goblins for one night of frivolity. To my mind it's all just good fun. Some Christians from other traditions, however, reject Halloween entirely. They say that it welcomes in the occult when we should be lifting up the holy. They have good intentions, and perhaps a reasonable theological point, but are missing where the spirit of the event truly lies. Its spirit and meaning is found in joy and friendship and community. In the same way that the Harry Potter books are not gateways to the occult but rather tales of friendship and faithfulness, Halloween is no different.

So when I first heard about the "Etsy Witch" selling spells and magical rituals on Etsy.com (a website for crafts) to help the Mariners clinch the playoffs (and possibly more) I didn't give it much thought. But perhaps we should. This crosses a big, red spiritual line in the sand. Much of Jesus' ministry was spent casting *out* spirits that harm people and that are not of God, sometimes ones that they invited in. When one begins to invoke spiritual powers and principalities other than God one is opening up a pandora's box of sorts. And while the example above seems innocuous and tame, others may not be. There have been recent reports of much darker activity among these online "witches" that have left some questioning the phenomenon of their existence. At the end of the day, God in Christ has triumphed over all forces of evil that ally themselves against those who stand for truth, love and light. But we are called by God to not only be open and supportive but wise and discerning.

Halloween, in actual fact, is the opposite of evil. It's the eve of All Saints Day, a day in which we remember the dead not because they're dead, but because they are *alive!* They lived their lives by the grace of God working in them, giving us an example of faithfulness. When times get rough we can think back to what they did, how God acted in and through them, and be inspired for the work God has yet to do in us. As we move closer and closer to Diocesan Convention (Oct. 25) and the day St Aidan's will be voted in as a parish of the Diocese, I think about this more and more. I think about the many people across time who through their labors and prayers have helped make St Aidan's what it is today. And I give thanks.

As you make your way through this amazing month of October may your days not only be filled with pumpkins and fall beauty, but joy, truth, and love.

"For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." (Matthew 6:21)



Episcopal 101 Coming in October



From the Junior Warden


"St. Aidan's Mission held its first service on August 2, 1959." That service took place in the West Stanwood Town Hall, but the congregation quickly moved to The Utsalady Ladies Aid Hall on Camano Island, until land was purchased for our current location on the south side of SR 532.



Our earliest mission structures were pre fabs and soon a trailer (often referred to as our Tin Box). Solid buildings came later, and finally a Sanctuary, designed by Frank Hunt. Frank and three other members constructed our new building. By February 2007, the work was done, and the Occupation Permit was issued.¹

The mission buildings were frequently enlarged and upgraded, and that is where we stand today. Soon our status will change from Mission to Parish, and we will have safer roofing to protect us from Pacific Northwest rain and drizzle. The roof material over the breezeway from Dietel Hall to the Sanctuary had failed; most of the rubber like roofing membrane was porous and the wood below had deteriorated to a woody sponge. See the below before and after photos.

The metal flashing atop the Parapet had failed to keep water away from the wood supports. The fire-retardant sheeting was not keeping out water; there was water rot and standing water bubbling as we stepped behind the parapet. The photos display the damage better than my words, please see the pictures (courtesy of Luke, our contractor).

A little epilogue from the 2025 Festival.


